FROM THE PASTOR

Lent has begun! I consider writing that we "celebrate" Lent, but I think "observe" is a more fitting word choice. Fasting, self-denial, and reflection, all of which are normally a part of Lent, are not really the kinds of things that one celebrates.

The Season of Lent is 40 days, not counting Sundays, before Easter. The number of days (40) derives from the number of days Jesus spent in the wilderness following his baptism. We do not include Sundays because no matter how dark, the resurrection still shines on us.

Rachel and I were blessed to be able to host 4 girls and a chaperone from the Asante Children's Choir a couple of weeks ago. As we shared stories, we were overwhelmed by the stark contrast between our normal lives and theirs - when they are at home in their native Uganda, that is. Even in the

houses with running water, hot water is rare. Almost all cooking is done on coal stoves. Where our children have cabinets full of toys, they may have no toys of their own.

We are certainly blessed by the availability of resources at our disposal!

I wonder sometimes if it is harder for us to learn to trust in God when we have so much access to so many resources that would grab our attention and challenge for our trust. So, for the season of Lent, we are working our way through something that affects ALL of us: excess. We have so MUCH. We are surrounded by so MUCH. If that weren't enough, much of our economy thrives on telling us we don't have enough. As though we need MORE.

Well, each of us needs more of some things, and less of others. We have chosen the

book 7: An Experimental Mutiny against Excess by Jen Hatmaker as a model for our observance of Lent this year. Ms. Hatmaker, a Christian author, blogger, and pastor's wife from Austin, writes in 7 about her own experiment with facing the excess that surrounds, that tempts us.

We are, after all, trying to follow Jesus better today than yesterday. Stuff can get in the way; but it doesn't have to.

Let's have some good, challenging conversations over the next 40 days about how we get stuff out of the way, or keep it from getting in the way, of following Jesus.

STEWARDSHIP MOMENT

Raising Cheerful Givers

Part 3 of 7 –

ALLOWANCE: A TEACHING TOOL

This is third in a series of articles on “Raising Cheerful Givers”. Helping our children understand financial principles will not only help them manage their money, but also become joyful stewards. As Howard Dayton states in his book, *Your Money Counts*, “Learning to handle money one step at a time is part of a child’s education, a part that parents cannot leave to teachers but must direct themselves.” We can begin helping them make wise choices at an early age. When children are too young to “work”, children need a source of money that enables them to learn how to save, spend and share. One such source is an allowance. Ideally, allowances should not be tied to chores, but you may consider paying children to do tasks for which you might otherwise pay

someone else. This can be a great opportunity to teach them about the connection between work, tithing and money and help them develop a sense of pride and responsibility in being compensated for achieving a hard-earned goal. Some general guidelines: Many parents start with one dollar per week for kindergartners and go up by one dollar per year through elementary school. As your child enters high school and becomes eligible for outside employment, it is a good idea to discontinue allowances during summer vacation because this will probably motivate your teen to earn some of his own money by having a summer job. When it comes to money, many times parents find it difficult to keep a good balance of giving to their children but also encouraging them to pick up more of the responsibility. This is a personal decision each parent needs to make given the age and maturity of their child. However, the most important thing you can

do is to have a plan that is clearly communicated to your child before a crisis of wills occurs. If we always give, give, give to your kids, someday they will experience a rude awakening. Clearly, over-indulgence with things can hinder the development of a child’s character and quickly destroy the need for initiative and motivation. In our affluent society, many of us are giving our kids so many things and spending so much on them, that we may be spoiling their chance of growing into responsible adults. The best response: an allowance. Once your kids have discretionary money of their own, you can begin to say to your child, “If that is what you really want, when you’ve saved enough money, I’d be happy to drive you to the store.” Our next issue will discuss the importance of teaching children how to budget and manage their money.

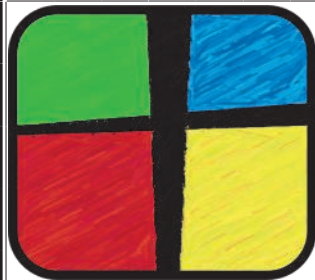
RUSSIAN VISIT
