ASH WEDNESDAY



Ash Wednesday emphasizes two themes: our sinfulness before God and our human

mortality. The service focuses on both themes, helping us to realize that both have been triumphed through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

During Ash Wednesday

services, the minister will lightly rub the sign of the cross with ashes onto the foreheads of worshipers. The use of ashes as a sign of mortality and repentance has a long history in Jewish and Christian worship. Historically, ashes signified purification and sorrow for sins. The ash cross on the forehead is an outward sign of our sorrow and repentance for sins. This act is called the imposition of ashes.

If you have ever wished to receive ashes on your way to work so that others can see this outward sign of your sorrow and repentance for sins, drive by the church, Ash Wednesday, March 5 for Ashes To Go between 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. Please invite our community to join us for this new adventure. We will also have an Ash Wednesday Service at 7:00 p.m.

LENT

Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday, March 5, and ends on Holy Saturday, (the day before Easter) April 19. Lent comes from the Anglo Saxon word *lencten*, which means "spring." The forty days represents the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation of Satan and preparing to begin his ministry.

Lent is a time of repentance, fasting and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time of self-examination and reflection. In the early church, Lent was a time to prepare new converts for baptism. Today, Christians focus on their relationship with God, often choosing to give up something or to volunteer and give of themselves for others. Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter" and



the reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection. Euleess First's theme through Lent is *Soul Tending*. Sermons will take this theme and use gardening metaphors to look at how we tend our souls. There will be different aspects of worship to remind us of the season. This includes a Lenten Wreath. The wreath counts down the Sundays to Easter, by extinguishing a candle each week. It will also become more and more barren as time passes. Second, we will be using ways to pray as our Children's messages. This message will be expanded on during a weekly intergenerational worship service each Wednesday evening 6:00-7:00 p.m. Wednesday Worship will have communion and a time of activities for those of any age to interact together.

Services will begin Wednesday, March 12, with Forgiveness as the topic.

FROM THE PASTOR

The season of Lent is historically a time of preparation for Easter. Lent is modeled on the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness.

Jesus, you will remember, was baptized in the Jordan River by John the Baptist, and immediately went into the wilderness to face temptation. Jesus having faced temptation helps us realize the extent to which God entered humanity in Jesus.

Lent is about our humanity. It is not always easy to stay aware of our humanity, let alone Jesus'. Yet I find it helpful to meditate on the truth that Jesus was, indeed, fully human.

We start Lent with Ash Wednesday because ashes remind us of our mortality, of our humanness. Ashes remind us of our limitations, our sin, our brokenness.

I want to invite you to remember, in addition to limitations and sin and brokenness, that God created us to be human. We too often steer headlong into what miserable sinners we are, forgetting that before there was bad, there was good. Creation came first. After creating humans, God looked at creation and pronounced it "very good."

I believe this is why, traditionally, some people "give up" something for Lent. The idea is

straightforward: get some thing or things that have cluttered life out of the way so we might be able to see again God's image in ourselves and one another.

Where can others see God's image in you? How have you seen God's reflection in others?

In addition to whatever you might give up for Lent or take on for Lent, I encourage you to be on the lookout for the image of our Creator in one another. In fact, God's image is in everyone-in every single person you pass in the store, on the street, or at work or school.

And for each of these, you and I have the opportunity to let's God's

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY



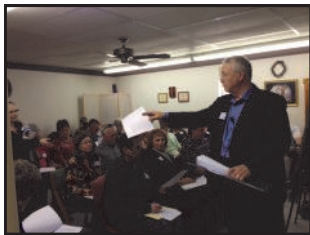

STEWARDSHIP MOMENT

Created to Give, Tempted to Keep

God created each of us with the willingness to give—to God and to others. We’re hard-wired to be givers; we need to be generous. Yet there are two “voices” that war against our God-given impulse toward generosity, tempting us to keep or hoard what we have.

1. Fear

The voice of fear says, “If you give, there may not be enough left over for you.” We are afraid to be generous because we are afraid of what might happen to us. What if we don’t have enough to fill the gas tank or buy groceries or pay the bills?

This voice may have been particularly loud and convincing during the last couple of years, as many of us have been unemployed and watched property values decline. I have friends and family members who have endured financial hardship lately.

But I must implore you to not give fear the power to eliminate generosity from your life. Fear,

along with a misplaced idea about the true source of our security, can keep us from being generous and lead us to hoard what we have. Yet the truth is that hoarding offers us no real security in this world.

2. Self-gratification

The voice of self-gratification says, “If you give, you won’t have enough money to buy the stuff you need to make you happy.”

I don’t have to tell you that we live in a culture that prizes abundance of possessions and pleasurable experiences above all else. We are convinced that a new car or a bigger house will make us happy. Giving away our money means that we won’t have enough to buy the latest and greatest electronic toy or take a lavish vacation. We don’t want to “miss out” or deprive ourselves, so our self-gratifying tendencies cause us to clutch our money tightly.

So, how do we defeat the voices of fear and self-gratification?

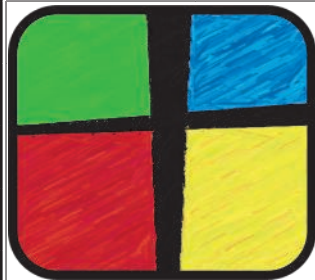
In a sense, they are defeated the moment we put our faith in Jesus Christ. Although we still

may wrestle with the voices from time to time, we are able to silence them more readily and effectively the more we grow in Christ.

And the more we grow in Christ, the more generous we become. One of the ways we can cultivate spiritual growth, and subsequently grow in generosity, is to realize that our entire lives belong to the Lord. Here’s a simple prayer I use that helps me commit all of my life to Christ:

*I am no longer my own, but thine.
 Put me to what thou wilt, rand me with whom thou wilt;
 Put me to doing, put me to suffering;
 Let me be employed for thee or laid aside for thee,
 Exalted for thee or brought low for thee;
 Let me be full, let me be empty;
 Let me have all things, let me have nothing;
 I freely and heartily yield all things to thy pleasure and disposal. ...
 Amen.*
