SPRING FLOWER SALE

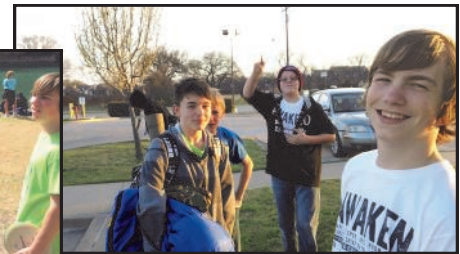

FROM THE PASTOR

Lent can begin as early as February 4 or as late as March 10. Lent depends, of course, on when Easter is. For most Christians, Easter is set as the first Sunday after the first full moon after the start of Spring.

This means that Lent always includes the first day of Spring. This is part of the reason for our gardening motif for Lent: Soul Tending. Like tending a garden, tending one's soul is something that takes time, effort, patience, and more patience.

Healthy, productive, vibrant gardens do not happen by

chance; neither do flourishing souls. I suppose that even if sin had never entered the picture for humanity, becoming the resplendent souls God had in mind would have taken work.

Lent is only 40 days. 40 days is hardly enough time to complete a garden much less a soul.

They say, though, that it takes 21-30 days to make a habit. What kind of habit could you start and commit yourself to that would help you grow your soul?

Here is one Rachel and I started years ago, in anticipation of having

children. At meals, we have committed to ignoring our phones.

We realized that someday we would have to limit our children's use of their phones, and that the best way to do that would include setting an example.

This habit took some effort. We had to be very intentional. I believe it has already paid off in our parenting. I believe it has also paid off in our souls.

What kind of habit could you start and commit yourself to that would help you grow your soul?

STEWARDSHIP MOMENT

Excerpts from: **Closing the Holes in Your Pockets and Maintaining the House of God** by Melvin Amerson

Growing up, I would often hear my elders using the phrase: "You are going through money like there are holes in your pockets" or "You cannot seem to keep any money." Those two phrases have remained with me over the years. It appears to me the believers in Haggai 1:2-6, possessed similar thoughts when it came to keeping money in their pockets. Today, we struggle with the same issues about priorities, saving money, and maintaining the House of God.

Perhaps the people in the Haggai text had misguided financial priorities as do those of us today who live in and are influenced by a consumer-driven culture. Like

people today, the people of that time were employed and had more than adequate incomes, but seemed unable to save any money. Setting priorities and establishing a personal budget helps us manage and focus on the things we value. What we value or treasure is often recorded in our checkbook register or credit card statements. Reviewing those documents provides a glimpse of our priorities. Have you had a check on your values and priorities lately?

The church in Haggai suffered because its members failed to make the church a priority. As a result of their neglect, the members could not manage to save and create personal financial reserves. Their failure to make the House of God a priority became their downfall. Ultimately, the House of God

fell into ruins due to lack of support and misplaced priorities.

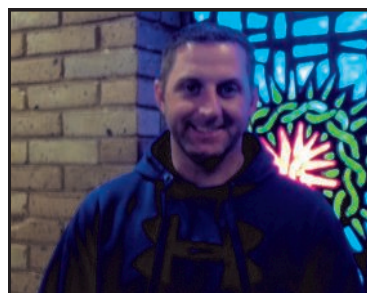
A remedy for this issue lies with a re-evaluation of personal finances. Place in your personal budget/spending plan your tithe or proportionate gift. Set aside a percentage or dollar amount for personal savings, emergencies, or retirement. This will allow you to establish priorities, help you to manage your financial resources, and "repair the holes" in your pockets and pocketbooks.

Remember, all that we have belongs to God. If we seek God first, maintain the House of God, and prioritize the rest of our provisions, we will have more than enough to live on.

"Moreover, it is required of stewards that they be found trustworthy" (I Corinthians 4:2, NRSV).
