

FROM THE PASTOR

It just dawned on me a couple of weeks ago that I finished seminary 25 years ago this past May. It doesn't seem that long ago, but, then, my parents always used to tell me time went by faster as you got older.

Thanks to the internet, I still keep up with some of my friends from seminary. Having attended seminary in Kentucky, many of my classmates were not from Texas. We are, literally, spread across the country.

I remember having had a great time in seminary. I was excited to be able to study deep into God's Word as well as theology, history, and philosophy. Everything seemed to come together there to prepare me for ministry. Or so I thought.

These days, honestly, I don't know how much I remember about the various and sundry things I learned in seminary. What I do remember from those years, though, and one of the things that has kept me going for 25 years now, is that God is bigger than any specific aspect of life or school. Just as important as this, I learned there that God would meet me anywhere, in anything, any time I sought.

Most of our classes were straight lecture courses, with books to read, papers to write, and tests to take. We had Chapel twice a week. Chapel experiences varied widely. One week a service might open with incense leading a processional of classically robed clergy. The next, we might be

singing along with guitars, the words projected with an overhead projector.

I found that whether I was in class, or in the least formal worship service ever or even the most formal, most ritualized worship service you can imagine, God showed up. God met me anywhere and everywhere. Every word, every conversation, every image, every movement included an opportunity to recognize God's presence and goodness. I believe this is still true today. I also believe it is as true for you as it isfor me. So, here's to the next 25 years of

So, here's to the next 25 years of God being available and willing to meet us anywhere and everywhere we are!
