Central Texas Conference churches are collecting these items at Ridglea UMC (6036 Locke Avenue, Fort Worth, TX 76116) on **July 23** between 3:00 & 7:00 PM. Ridglea volunteers will assist you in loading the items into transport vehicles and will drive the items to the collection point, the Rio Grande Valley Food Bank in South Texas, on July 24.

Eules First United Methodist Women have agreed to help deliver donations. Other volunteers are welcome.

*\*\*Please note that all donated items must be new and only those items on the list will be accepted. They must be contained and labeled before being dropped off at Ridglea UMC.*

The conference office is also in communication with the North Texas Conference about needs for the children who are being housed in the facility in Dallas. Because this is a federal facility, there are no opportunities for donations at this time.

It is anticipated that there will be a need for foster families in the future. 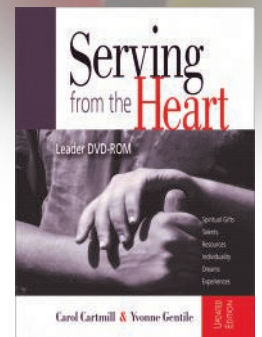

## FROM THE PASTOR

"We've always done it that way!" Every one of us has muttered, or proudly shouted, this phrase at one time or another.

Sometimes, as the words leave our lips we shrink towards the fact that change is inevitable.

At other times, though, we feel completely justified in holding onto the past with white-knuckled tenacity. Clearly, the question is not whether or not to change; the question is what kind of change ought we allow, and what kind ought we seek?

Unless you still travel everywhere by foot and speak the English of King James, you cannot claim to stand against all change.

On the other hand, unless you've recently come up with a new, better way to tie shoes or spread mustard on a hot dog, you may not be the early-adopter you want to be.

As a young pastor, I thought I was all about change. I was ready to overturn every table in every temple, thinking I would thereby lead the way to change, to renewal, to revitalizing the

United Methodist Church I love and was raised in.

While this may surprise some of you, I am no longer nearly as eager to change as I once was. Chalk it up to age and experience if you will, but I'd like to think there is something else going on.

You see, once upon a time, I thought God wanted me to change the church, to lead it into "a future filled with hope." I do not think this way any longer.

I still understand God's call on me to lead, but the bright, exciting future I am called to lead toward is a future God has in mind, rather than one I have in mind.

The future God has in store for us is bright, I believe, and "filled with hope" indeed! I trust St. Paul, though, when he reminds us that getting to the future God has for us means realizing and keeping in mind that God is "able to do far beyond all that we could ask or imagine" (Ephesians 3:20). We do not have to trust or know the future, we have to trust God,

who leads us into the future.

But we don't simply sit back and dream about a future while clutching the past. We hold onto Jesus who is the same yesterday, today, and forever. (Hebrews 13:8)

We ought to finish that verse from Ephesians. The entire thought, including verses 20 and 21 is this:

Glory to God, who is able to do far beyond all that we could ask or imagine by his power at work within us; glory to him in the church and in Christ Jesus for all generations, forever and always. Amen.

God intends to bring us into the future that is beyond "anything we can ask or imagine" and to do so "by his power at work within us."

The future is God's, but God brings this great future into the present in and through the church, God's people!

May you face the change before you, knowing that you face it with God!

## ANNUAL CONFERENCE FOLLOW UP

The Annual Conference of the Methodist Church held in Mansfield provided a great picture of the diversity of our denomination. It was very uplifting, to see the big tent that welcomes so many different people. It is one area that makes me proud to be a United Methodist.

The focus of this year's conference was intentional faith development. Three excellent teachers led us—each one developing a theme to help our churches to be more effective as the church transitions to meet new demands.

I participated in the workshop led by Dr. Phil Maynard. Much of this material came from his experience as a conference leader and author. Most churches seem

to be stuck in a pattern of “we have always done it this way” and miss bringing people to the church. The good news is that our church is doing many of the things that help it grow. Our hospitality is solid, but there are opportunities still unexplored. In his book *Shift*, Dr. Maynard urges more Wesley type fellowship where we have greater connection with those coming to our church for the first time.

Other topics discussed include making disciples, serving rather than being served, developing generosity and leading without getting trampled. His book provides a good road map for becoming the church Christ wants us to be.

As a lay person, it is always

exciting to hear about the Lydia Patterson Institute. This school prepares non-English speaking students from El Paso and Juarez to face life with the best education possible. The success rate is above average, with most receiving college scholarships. This year we were introduced to two students who are serving internships at Hurst UMC. I recommend that our church look for ways we can be more supportive outside our apportionment as this Methodist Institution prepares for its Centennial celebration.

Being a delegate is a wonderful way to learn about our Methodist denomination and the things that make us strong.

## STEWARDSHIP MOMENT

### Apportionments

The main way we support the ministries of the church is through our apportioned funds, a method of giving that proportionally allocates the church wide budget to conferences and local churches.

Apportionments have their antecedents in John Wesley's classes where he always received an offering, even going so far as to suggest an amount. In the former Evangelical United Brethren Church, apportionments were unknown. They were called "askings". Although the congregations generously contributed to the world-wide support of the denomination's mission, a centralized method of calculating and collecting pensions was not part of their polity. The word "apportionments" came to the United Methodist Church from the old Methodist tradition, but they, the Evangelicals and the United Brethren all had methods of aggregating mission funds.

As United Methodists, we accept and affirm that the primary task of our church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ; to proclaim the gospel, the good news; and to seek and to welcome and gather people of faith into the body of Christ. When one joins a United Methodist congregation, one

becomes a member of the total United Methodist connection. We define that connection as a network of interdependent and interrelated relationships among persons in groups at the local, regional, national and international levels. As members, we promise God and our congregation that we will uphold the church with our prayers, our presence, our gifts, our service and our witness. And that church is the local church, or the district, or the annual conference or even the general church. 1 Corinthians 12:12 states, "For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ."

Together, through our connected congregations, we accomplish what no single church, district or annual conference ever could hope to do alone. In this way, each individual, each family, each congregation gives a fair share for the church's work. We combine our prayers, presence, gifts and service to make a significant difference in the lives of God's people.

The general funds include:

World Service Fund, Ministerial Education Fund, Episcopal Fund, Black College Fund,

Interdenominational Cooperation Fund, Africa University Fund, and General Administration Fund

The jurisdictional funds include:

Jurisdictional Administration, Lydia Patterson, Mount Sequoyah, and SMU Campus Ministry

The Conference funds include:

Center for Leadership, Center for Evangelism and Church Growth, Center for Mission Support, and Organization and Administration.

The Central Texas Conference in recent years has gone away from referring to these moneys as "Apportionments" and now refers to them as "Connectional Missions Giving."

Apportionments over the years have changed from when Wesley was telling class members to give in support of missions. Today there is much more administration cost covered than direct care for missions. While that is true, our understanding of being connected is that Apportionments are part of our obligation to the larger church. Together we make possible what no church can do on their own. Apportioned giving holds central importance in our distinctive Wesleyan tradition of stewardship for the furthering of the mission and ministry of The United Methodist Church.
