DISCIPLE BIBLE STUDIES

Fall will have an assortment of opportunities to grow and develop as disciples. Disciple I is a basis for all other studies in the Disciple family. This 34 week study covers the entire Bible. This small group discussion based class aims to transform not just inform. Classes will begin August 25 and run through May 18, with Lynne and Alan Moffatt facilitating.

This is designated as part of Euless First's Discipleship Journey.

It has been a wonderful 14 months. You have blessed us with energy, enthusiasm, and passion for seeking God's will. Honestly, there is a part of me that never wants to take a vacation lest I miss something here! On the other hand, we are blessed with a solid staff and very committed, active membership. Nothing is more encouraging for a Senior Pastor than to be able to take vacation and not worry about how the church is doing.

I have not worried a bit this past week of vacation.

Our congregation has seen

growth in every way. Worship attendance is up. We had more new members in the first half of this year than in most years.

Anticipating this growth, our Finance Committee and Church Council planned a very optimistic budget for this 2013. It was a step forward in faith that we are following in the direction God is leading us.

This budget was, honestly, a stretch. Some families are still feeling the effects of the recession. After much prayer and discussion, though, we, as a church, stepped out on faith financially.

To bring you up to date on this endeavor, our spending is running slightly behind budget. Income, on the other hand is running a bit further behind the budget.

In simple terms, for the past few months, we have been spending approximately \$3,500 more per month than we have been taking in. The good news is we have had the money to do this. The bad news is we won't have the money to keep doing this.

Our Finance Committee and Church Council have both just met. I invite you to join me in holding our congregation's leader up in prayer. I also invite you to prayerfully consider your giving. YOU may be a part of the answers to prayers that we, Euleess First UMC, can continue to follow God's leading into a future of hope and promise.

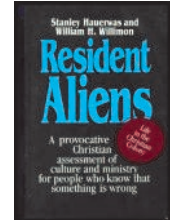
BOOK CLUB

TITHING

Uncommon Sense by: Becky Jones from UMC.org

Part 1: We all know what common sense is, right? We've received common-sense advice from our parents and, in turn, bestow it upon our children, grandchildren or anyone else who will listen.

At a recent mother-daughter banquet in my local United Methodist Women unit, we played a game that was based on the idea of how we pass along common-sense advice from one generation to the next. The women and girls were asked to write down their answers to the following questions:

What was the best advice your mother ever gave you?

What was the best advice you ever gave (or would give) your daughter or son?

We came up with some wonderful, common-sense answers. For instance, "Don't go into the forest alone" and "Never pet stray dogs" are common-sense axioms that some of our younger attendees -- ages 5 and 6 -- considered the best

advice they'd received from their mothers.

When it came to the best advice ever given to a child, one of our older members wrote that the best thing she ever taught her children was to: "Tithe early so it will be easier when you grow up."

Having been on the receiving end of that nugget of insight, I can attest to its common sensibility. Yet the simplicity of my mother's advice seems to have gotten muddled in the translation from her Depression-era generation to my 1960s peers. It has become what I call uncommon sense.

We are a generation of women and men who have lost sight of the importance and necessity of tithing and making offerings -- no matter how small they might be. But the problem doesn't stop there. Our children are becoming heirs to our lack of understanding and imitators of our practices.

I've wondered why financial giving seems to be a natural response for some folks and an onerous chore for others. After all, Jesus never said our gifts must be substantial or greater than the next person's. In fact, he preached just the opposite.

While teaching in the temple, Jesus observed rich people depositing large sums of money into a collection plate. Then he saw a poor widow put in two copper coins -- a mere penny. Then, as now, the conventional wisdom -- the common-sense conclusion -- was that the rich people's contributions would do more good than the widow's two puny coins. But Jesus taught otherwise. He said:

"Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all of them; for all of them have contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty has put in all she had to live on." (Luke 21:3-4)

Perhaps we lack the motivation to give because we assume small gifts don't matter. We may be waiting until we can afford to give something substantial, something that would make a difference.
