



The mission of Euless First United Methodist Church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ. Our Discipleship Plan is the Discipleship Journey; an intentional process by which we guide persons via Individual Studies, Small Group Studies and Retreat Events. The hope is to move people from knowing God, to growing in relationship with God, to going forth with God to serve others, and finally,



glowing for God by witnessing to their faith.

FROM THE PASTOR

As you've likely read in the letter from Dave Lewis, our Lay Leader, we, as a church are in a bit of a tight spot financially right now. If you have not read that letter yet, take a few minutes to go find it in this newsletter, read it, and then come back to this.

Ok. As part of our "Long and Winding Road" series, we are inviting everyone to consider their own faith story. For most of us, this is a long and winding road.

Our current financial situation reminds us that this is not so simple as your

faith story and my faith story and everyone else's individual faith story.

We all also share a faith story. The faith story we share is the story that connects us together and with this church; Euless First United Methodist Church. This story that we share goes back to 1876, and may carry on far into the future.

Every story worth telling or worth listening to had ups and downs, twists and turns. In a word, every good story has conflict. Even our faith stories, individual and communal, have conflict.

Conflict in stories takes many

forms. It may be between people, or between people and other, outside forces.

As the people of God, we have the opportunity to witness to our faith in God by how we deal with conflict. If we focus on being faithful as we face conflict together, I expect we will be able to look back and see that God was guiding us through the most challenging times.

CONSTITUTION WEEK

Tuesday, September 17, 2013, begins the national celebration of Constitution Week. Our Constitution stands as a testament to the tenacity of Americans throughout history to maintain their liberties and freedom, and to ensure those unalienable rights to every American.

The tradition of celebrating the Constitution was started many years ago by the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR). In 1955, the Daughters petitioned Congress to set aside September 17-23 annually to be dedicated for the observance of Constitution Week. The resolution was later adopted by the U.S. Congress and signed into Public Law #915 on August

2, 1956 by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. The aims of the celebration are to (1) emphasize citizens' responsibilities for protecting and defending the Constitution, preserving it for posterity; (2) inform the people that the Constitution is the basis for America's great heritage and the foundation for our way of life; and (3) encourage the study of the historical events which led to the framing of the Constitution in September 1787.

DAR has served America for 123 years as its foremost cheerleader. In 1928, the Daughters began work on a building as a memorial to the Constitution. John Russell Pope, architect of the Jefferson Memorial, was commissioned to

design the performing arts center, known as DAR Constitution Hall. Today, DAR Constitution Hall is the only structure erected in tribute to the Constitution of the United States of America.

The United Methodist Church has had a long history and respect for the Constitution. The organization of the denomination resembles that of the U.S. government. The General Conference is the top legislative body; the nine-member Judicial Council is the "supreme court"; and the Council of Bishops is similar to the executive branch.

Please take this time to remember our history and its significance for us as people of faith.

Part 2: I think about that poor widow and how she must have felt when she laid down her last two coins. She was a marginalized person. Women, in general, were considered second-class citizens in Jesus' time, and a widow was worse off than married women because she had no husband to provide for her. If anyone had a reason to hold onto her money, it was the widow. For all she knew, those two coins were the only thing standing between her and starvation.

But she must have known something the rich people didn't. She must have had a faith so strong she literally trusted her life

to God. I suspect her faith was the result of years of practice. Perhaps she believed her gift, in spite of its size, could help someone worse off than her.

The widow went to the temple to worship. She made an offering not knowing who would benefit from it, but trusting that God had great things in store for her two copper coins.

The widow walked away from the temple poorer from an economic standpoint but blessed in ways she never would have imagined. The rich people left only with their financial security. Who do you suppose was closer to God's kingdom? Why is that lesson so difficult for us to remember?

We have incredible opportunities

everyday to help people in our neighborhoods, across our country and around our world through United Methodist Women's many channels of giving. And it doesn't matter if we contribute two copper coins or 200 coins. Each and every gift is important. When we all put in our "two-cents worth," God blesses and multiplies our efforts to change the world.

The best advice my mother ever gave me -- how to put those nickels and dimes to work through tithes and offerings -- has helped me to see and to be part of God's kingdom on earth. We all could use a little more of such uncommon sense in our lives.

OPERATION BACK 2 SCHOOL

We had a great campaign to help students of the HEB ISD with backpacks and school supplies. Eules First raised \$3,413, with

BLOOD PRESSURE SCREENING

Blood pressure (BP), sometimes referred to as arterial blood pressure, is the pressure exerted by circulating blood upon the walls of blood vessels, and is one of the principal vital signs. When used without further specification,

"blood pressure" usually refers to the arterial pressure of the systemic circulation. During each heartbeat, blood pressure varies between a maximum (systolic) and a minimum (diastolic) pressure.

For most of us, we just know it is

not healthy for your blood pressure to be too high or too low. In our continual care for our congregation, Eules First's Faith Community Nurse, Marilyn Long offers blood pressure screenings.

- Perkins Ministry Intern, Stefani Reed arrives at Eules First September 1


Recently, I was at a visioning meeting and heard the slogan: "Remembering our History and Living our Future." I loved hearing stories of our history as I visited with so many of you at the recent picture taking events for the Pictorial Directory. We are a congregation with a rich history. We are living a great present and are building for our future. However, despite all of our excitements in ministry, we are currently experiencing some financial challenges.

We are doing great in debt reduction and project completion. Over the last 6 years we have continued to update our campus. Our most recent addition was a 52 space parking lot, while we reduced our building debt to \$260,000. You have been so generous in making this happen and we rejoice in this progress. But, we are expanding our ministries a bit quicker than our giving. With 66% of the calendar year behind us, we find expenses are \$3500 more than our receipts monthly.

Our church has a rich history of giving when informed of where we are and what is needed. Linda and I fell a little behind in our giving over the summer and we will be catching up with our tithe. We ask each of you to review where you are year-to-date and "make it up" if you got a bit behind. If you were not able to pledge for 2013, would you consider doing so now? Finally, if you are in a position to give extra to help fill our \$42,000 deficit (\$3500 x 12), so we can keep up our wonderful growth momentum, please prayerfully consider it.
